EQIC is pleased to offer ROADE Work, a comprehensive and strategic approach in our opioid adverse drug event initiative.

Our CMS goals are to reduce ADEs related to opioids by 7% and opioid overprescribing by 12% over the course of the four-year EQIC program. These are tough goals, but critically important to addressing the opioid epidemic.

The opioid programming will be concentrated into a "sprint," which means that we will be using rapid-cycle change principles in order to see a large impact in a short amount of time. Our course content will kick off with a webinar on July 27 at 1 p.m. and will provide an overview of the EQIC ROADE Work curriculum.

During the course of the sprint, we will hear from various subject matter experts in opioid prescribing, pain management, screening and monitoring, transitions of care, provider stigma, patient and family engagement and more.
